
Stone to Bread -

This would be using the divine gifts or powers God has given us for selfish purposes or to satisfy natural appetites. We may not be able to turn a stone to bread but we are given the divine gift to, with God, create life. But other divine gifts may include talents, social or intellectual gifts or anything we have been blessed with that could bless the lives of others - Satan could tempt us to use them to only satisfy our own desires.



Jump from the Pinnacle -

One possibility for a universal temptation in this situation is the desire to not want to accept responsibility for our actions. I want to do what I want to do but I expect others to deal with the consequences, whether that is God or our fellow brothers and sisters. Along with that might be a desire to blame others for our circumstances rather than self reflect.



All the Kingdoms of the World -

Many of us may not think that having control of all the kingdoms of the world would be much of a temptation but Luke offers another piece to this temptation...

In Luke 4:6, Satan says "All this power will I give thee..."

Power - power to do what? Control others. Within each of us is the desire to control what others think and do. Or to have the rules and laws apply to everyone else, but ourselves.



C.S. Lewis - "Mere Christianity"

"Only those who try to resist temptation know how strong it is. After all, you find out the strength of the German army by fighting against it, not by giving in. You find out the strength of a wind by trying to walk against it, not by lying down. A man who gives in to temptation after five minutes simply does not know what it would have been like an hour later. That is why bad people, in one sense, know very little about badness — they have lived a sheltered life by always giving in. We never find out the strength of the evil impulse inside us until we try to fight it: and Christ, because He was the only man who never yielded to temptation, is also the only man who knows to the full what temptation means..."

Interestingly, we know that Jesus has the power to achieve everything Satan tempted him with - He does miraculously produce food, but for others, not himself (Water to wine John 2:1–11, Feeding thousands John 6:1-14 and making nets overflow with fish Matthew 4:18–22; John 21:5-6). He would also receive divine confirmation of and assistance with His ministry (Remember his baptism and the Mount of Transfiguration - Mark 1:9-11; Matthew 17:1–5; Luke 22:41–44), and we know He will one day rule the world as Lord of all (Zechariah 14:9; Revelation 11:15) but, in order to help us all come to heaven for the Glory of the Father - not his own glory.

Satan's temptation was for Jesus to attempt to fulfill his divine identity at Satan's bidding instead of waiting for the right time and the right way. Jesus would establish His divine identity as the Son of God in ways that aligned with Heavenly Father's will, not Satan's.



The fertile plain on the western shore of the Sea of Galilee, toward the northern end, 1 mile broad and 2½ miles long, 500 feet below the level of the Mediterranean. In our Lord's day it was considered the best part of Galilee, but it became desolate and uncultivated until the rise of modern Israel (Matt. 14:34; Mark 6:53). The "lake of Gennesaret" refers to the Sea of Galilee. See Galilee, Sea of.

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Possible Lessons

- 1. The call was extended after an acquisition of wealth in the fish they caught. Now what will they choose the work of God or the priorities of man.
- 2. They would be called to leave their families and as providers may have worried about them instead of concentrating on their ministry. This massive catch demonstrates that God can and will take care of them while they are gone.
- 3. Jesus is demonstrating that through him, a miraculous work would be performed to bring people into the gospel. It conjures up images of Jeremiah's prophecy in 16:16 that God would send many fishers to fish souls or that of Ezekiel in 47:10 that abundant fish would be caught in the living waters proceeding from the temple.

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
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

"Jesus said to Peter, 'Fear not; from henceforth thou shalt catch men.' Luke then tells us, 'When they had brought their ships to land, they forsook all, and followed him' [Luke 5:10–11]. They became the Lord's disciples.

"The word for disciple and the word for discipline both come from the same Latin root—discipulus, which means pupil. It emphasizes practice or exercise. Self-discipline and self-control are consistent and permanent characteristics of the followers of Jesus, as exemplified by Peter, James, and John, who indeed 'forsook all, and followed him.'



"What is discipleship? It is primarily obedience to the Savior. Discipleship includes many things. It is chastity. It is tithing. It is family home evening. It is keeping all the commandments. It is forsaking anything that is not good for us. ...

"... Discipleship [requires] us to forsake evil transgression and enjoy what President Spencer W. Kimball has called 'the miracle of forgiveness' [see The Miracle of Forgiveness (1969), 362]. This can come only through repentance, which means that we forsake sin and resolve each day to be followers of truth and righteousness. As Jesus taught, 'What manner of men ought ye to be? Verily I say unto you, even as I am' [3 Nephi 27:27]" ("Discipleship," GC Oct. 2006, Ensign or Liahona, Nov. 2006, 20, 22).
