In the King James Version of the Bible, the word angels, which was used in reference to these men (see Genesis 19:1), was translated from the Hebrew word malakhim, which can also mean "messengers." Although we do not know the identity of the three messengers, Abraham treated them as if they were presiding authorities of the Lord's kingdom then on the earth, and their messages were directly from the Lord

Sarah's astonished laughter at the news that she was to conceive and bear a son should not be interpreted as proving her lack of faith. Often in the scriptures the servants of the Lord are astonished beyond belief at the miraculous goodness of the Lord. Moses could not believe that he was capable of being God's spokesman with the pharaoh and asked that he receive help (see Exodus 4:10-17). Gideon needed dramatic proof that the Lord wanted him to deliver Israel from the Midianites (see Judges 6:11-24). Hezekiah asked for confirmation that Isaiah's promise of extended life was really of the Lord (see 2 Kings 20:1-11). Zachariah was struck dumb so that he would know that his wife Elizabeth would conceive (see Luke 1:19-20). And when the disciples saw the resurrected Lord for the first time, Luke tells us, "they yet believed not for joy" (Luke 24:41). It was the incredible nature of the news that caused Sarah's response. And after approximately seventy years of childlessness, who could condemn her temporary inability to believe the joyous promise?

"It is possible that Lot's wife looked back with resentment toward the Lord for what He was asking her to leave behind"

"I plead with you not to dwell on days now gone, nor to yearn vainly for yesterdays, however good those yesterdays may have been. The past is to be learned from but not lived in. We look back to claim the embers from glowing experiences but not the ashes. And when we have learned what we need to learn and have brought with us the best that we have experienced, then we look ahead, we remember that faith is always pointed toward the future. Faith always has to do with blessings and truths and events that will yet be efficacious in our lives. So a more theological way to talk about Lot's wife is to say that she did not have faith. She doubted the Lord's ability to give her something better than she already had. Apparently she thought—fatally, as it turned out—that nothing that lay ahead could possibly be as good as those moments she was leaving behind"

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
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
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Billie Eilish says porn exposure while young caused nightmares

Singer Billie Eilish has described how she suffered nightmares after being exposed to "abusive" pornography from the age of 11.

Speaking on SiriusXM, the 19-year-old said she is now "devastated" to reflect on her exposure to the content.

Eilish said the experience led her to "not say no to things that were not good" when she began having sex.

"It was because I thought that's what I was supposed to be attracted to," the Grammy Award-winner said.

Eilish, who is about to turn 20, has spent much of her teenage life in the public eye. She forged a reputation for wearing a baggy style of dress and has regularly spoken about body image and being sexualised while growing up.

The topic of pornography came up in the interview as it is referenced in a song, Male Fantasy, on her album Happier Than Ever.

certainly no champion of family values, having <u>recently offered</u> an obscene denunciation of the Texas abortion law in the name of women's rights, and Howard Stern—it seems safe to assume—is not about to turn into an anti-pornography crusader anytime soon. But this makes Eilish's interview that much more striking: the pandemic of pornography, especially among children, has reached such disastrous proportions that nearly everyone can see there's a problem—although few seem prepared to admit how deep the problem goes.

Eilish confessed that she had first been exposed to pornography at age 11, and, thinking she was supposed to like it and the acts it depicted, became hooked for a time. Now, she says, "As a woman, I think porn is a disgrace. I think it really destroyed my brain and I feel incredibly devastated that I was exposed to so much porn.... I'm so angry that porn is so loved, and I'm so angry at myself for thinking that it was OK." She went on to lament the ways in which pornography gives viewers a fundamentally distorted perception of human sexuality, depicting as "normal" behaviors that are anything but, and leaving children—who have nothing else to go on—permanently confused about the purpose of sex.

Eilish is surely right in her diagnosis, but it is striking that in her remarks, and much of the reporting about them, the focus has revolved around issues of "consent." The BBC, for instance, <u>admonishes</u> us that UNICEF warns "that pornography that portrays abusive and misogynistic acts can lead to

Abimelech desires Sarah, who is preserved by the Lord—Abraham prays for Abimelech, and the Lord blesses him and his household.

AND Abraham journeyed from thence toward the south country, and dwelled between Kadesh and ^aShur, and sojourned in ^bGerar.

2 And Abraham said of Sarah his wife, She is my sister: and ^aAbimelech king of Gerar sent, and took Sarah.

3 But ^aGod came to Abimelech in a dream by night, and said to him, Behold, thou art but a dead man, for the woman which thou hast taken; for she is a man's wife.

4 But Abimelech had not come

near her: and he said, Lord, wilt thou slay also ^aa righteous nation?

5 Said he not unto me, She is my asister? and she, even she herself said, He is my brother: in the cintegrity of my heart and innocency of my hands have I done this.

6 And God said unto him in a dream, Yea, I know that thou didst this in the integrity of thy heart; for I also withheld thee from sinning against me: therefore suffered I thee not to touch her.

7 Now therefore restore the man his wife; for he is a prophet, and he shall apray for thee, and thou shalt live: and if thou restore her not, know thou that thou shalt surely die, thou, and all that are thine.

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

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

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

"Another Oriental [Eastern] custom is that of bargaining. One evening a good friend of mine, a Jerusalem shopkeeper, told me that he didn't get a bit of fun out of charging Americans, unschooled in bargaining, many times more than an article was worth. He appreciated their money, but he would rather bargain with them.

"Westerners may be surprised to know that the account of Abraham's purchase of the field of Ephron, with the cave in which to bury Sarah, is in reality a description of an ancient bargaining scene. When Abraham assured his Hittite friends that he would pay Ephron "as much money as it is worth," Ephron stepped forward and said, "Nay, my lord, hear me: the field give I thee, and the cave that is therein, I give it thee; in the presence of the sons of my people give I it thee: bury thy dead." (Gen. 23:9–11.)

"Most readers think that Ephron was a most kind and generous man in offering the field and cave to Abraham for nothing. Actually his words were nothing but a polite gesture to a customer. Observe that Abraham finally paid the four hundred shekels proposed by Ephron for his property. (See Gen. 23:13–16.)"
