







7 For when they came into the house, he lay on his bed in his bedchamber, and they smote him, and slew him, and beheaded him, and took his head, and gat them away through the plain all night.

8 And they brought the head of Ish-bosheth unto David to Hebron, and said to the king, Behold the head of Ish-bosheth the son of Saul thine enemy, which sought thy life; and the LORD hath avenged my lord the king this day of Saul, and of his seed.

9 ¶ And David answered Rechab and Baanah his brother, the sons of Rimmon the Beerothite, and said unto them, As the LORD liveth, who hath redeemed my soul out of all adversity,

10 When one told me, saying, Behold, ^aSaul is ^bdead, thinking to have brought good tidings, I took hold of him, and slew him in Ziklag, who thought that I would have given him a reward for his tidings:

11 How much more, when wicked men have slain a righteous person in his own house upon his bed? shall I not therefore now require his blood of your hand, and take you away from the earth?

12 And David commanded his young men, and they slew them, and cut off their hands and their feet, and hanged them up over the pool in Hebron. But they took the head of Ish-bosheth, and buried it in the sepulchre of Abner in Hebron.

CHAPTER 5

All Israel anoints David king—He takes Jerusalem and is blessed of the Lord— He conquers the Philistines.

THEN came all the tribes of Israel

to ^aDavid unto Hebron, and spake, saying, Behold, we are thy bone and thy flesh.

2 Also in time past, when Saul was king over us, thou wast he that leddest out and broughtest in Israel: and the LORD said to thee, Thou shalt feed my people Israel, and thou shalt be a captain over Israel.

3 So all the elders of Israel came to the king to Hebron; and king David made a league with them in Hebron before the LORD: and they ^aanointed ^bDavid ^cking over Israel.

4 ¶ David was thirty years old when he began to areign, and he ^breigned forty years.

5 In Hebron he reigned over ^aJudah seven years and six months: and in Jerusalem he breigned thirty and three years over all Israel and Judah.

6 ¶ And the king and his men went to Jerusalem unto the ^aJebusites, the inhabitants of the land: which spake unto David, saying, Except thou take away the blind and the lame, thou shalt not come in hither: thinking, David cannot come in hither.

7 Nevertheless David took the strong hold of ^aZion: the same is the ^bcity of David.

8 And David said on that day, Whosoever getteth up to the gutter, and smiteth the ^aJebusites, and the lame and the blind, that are hated of David's soul, he shall be chief and captain. Wherefore they said, The blind and the lame shall not come into the house.

9 So David dwelt in the fort, and called it the acity of David. And David built round about from ^bMillo and inward.

10 And David went on, and grew great, and the LORD God of hosts was with him.

11 ¶ And ^aHiram king of Tyre sent messengers to David, and cedar trees, and carpenters, and masons: and they built David an house.

12 And David perceived that the LORD had established him king over Israel, and that he had exalted his kingdom for his people Israel's sake.

13 ¶ And David took him more concubines and awives out of Jerusalem, after he was come from Hebron: and there were yet bons and daughters born to David.

19 And David inquired of the LORD, saying, Shall I go up to the Philistines? wilt thou deliver them into mine hand? And the LORD said unto David, Go up: for I will doubtless deliver the Philistines into thine hand.

20 And David came to ^aBaalperazim, and David smote them there, and said, The LORD hath broken forth upon mine enemies before me, as the breach of waters. Therefore he called the name of that place Baal-perazim.

21 And there they left their ^aimages, and David and his men burned them.

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23 And when David inquired of the LORD, he said, Thou shalt not go up; but fetch a compass behind them, and come upon them over against the mulberry trees.

24 And let it be, when thou hearest the sound of a going in the tops of the mulberry trees, that then thou shalt bestir thyself: for then shall the LORD go out before thee, to smite the host of the Philistines.

25 And David did so, as the LORD had commanded him; and smote the ^aPhilistines from Geba until thou come to Gazer.

CHAPTER 6

David takes the ark to the city of David—Uzzah is smitten for steadying the ark and dies—David dances before the Lord, causing a breach between him and Michal.

AGAIN, David ^agathered together all the chosen men of Israel, thirty thousand.

2 And David arose, and went with all the people that were with him from Baale of Judah, to bring up from thence the ^aark of God, whose name is called by the name of the LORD of hosts that dwelleth between the bcherubims.

3 And they set the ark of God upon a new cart, and brought it out of the house of Abinadab that was in Gibeah: and Uzzah and Ahio, the sons of Abinadab, drave the new cart.

4 And they brought it out of the house of Abinadab which was at Gibeah, accompanying the ark of God: and Ahio went before the ark.

5 And David and all the house of Israel played before the LORD on all manner of instruments made of fir wood, even on aharps, and on

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
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8 And David was displeased, because the LORD had made a breach upon Uzzah: and he called the name of the place ^aPerez-uzzah to this day.

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10 So David would not remove the ark of the LORD unto him into the city of David: but David carried it aside into the house of Obed-edom the Gittite.

11 And the ark of the LORD continued in the house of Obed-edom the Gittite three months: and the LORD blessed Obed-edom, and all his household.

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

The ark of the covenant was a sacred vessel that housed some of the holiest objects in Israel's history. To touch the ark or its contents was strictly forbidden by the Lord. Only authorized Levites, and they only under certain specified conditions, could handle the sacred instruments (see Numbers 4:15). Uzzah may have exhibited some bold presumption when he sought to touch that which God had forbidden to be touched. Even if Uzzah's intention was simply to keep the ark from falling, it should be remembered that God was fully capable of steadying His own ark had He wished to do so. While much of the story is not known, it is an excellent example that the commands of God are sacred and must be observed precisely as the Lord decreed.

"It is a little dangerous for us to go out of our own sphere and try unauthoritatively to direct the efforts of a brother. You remember the case of Uzzah who stretched forth his hand to steady the ark. He seemed justified when the oxen stumbled in putting forth his hand to steady that symbol of the covenant. We today think his punishment was very severe. Be that as it may, the incident conveys a lesson of life. Let us look around us and see how quickly men who attempt unauthoritatively to steady the ark die spiritually. Their souls become embittered, their minds distorted, their judgment faulty, and their spirit depressed. Such is the pitiable condition of men who, neglecting their own responsibilities, spend their time in finding fault with others" (David O. McKay, in Conference Report, Apr. 1936, 60).

AND it came to pass, when the king sat in his house, and the LORD had given him ^arest round about from all his enemies;

18 ¶ Then went king David in, and sat before the LORD, and he said, Who am I, O Lord GoD? and what is my house, that thou hast brought me hitherto?

19 And this was yet a small thing in thy sight, O Lord GoD; but thou hast spoken also of thy servant's

house for a great while to come. And is this the manner of man, O Lord GoD?

20 And what can David say more unto thee? for thou, Lord GoD, ^aknowest thy servant.

21 For thy word's sake, and according to thine own heart, hast thou done all these ^agreat things, to make thy servant know *them*.

David's Might Men - 1 Samuel 23; 1 Chronicles 12

"The exploits recorded here were probably taken from various times in David's life and placed together at this point." (Institute Manual)

- "They were armed with bows, and could use both the right hand and the left in hurling stones and shooting arrows out of a bow" (1 Chr. 12:2).
- They were men "fit for the battle, that could handle shield and buckler, whose faces were like the faces of lions, and were as swift as the roes upon the mountains" (1 Chr. 12:8).
- They were "men that had understanding of the times, to know what Israel ought to do" (1 Chr. 12:32).
- They were men "which could keep rank: they were not of double heart" (1 Chr. 12:33).
- "All these men of war, that could keep rank, came with a perfect heart to Hebron, to make David king over all Israel: and all the rest also of Israel were of one heart to make David king" (1 Chr. 12:38).

"One inspiring account tells of three of these mighty men who overheard King David long for a drink of water from the well of Bethlehem [which, at this time of war, was controlled by the Philistines]. Apparently, in Bethlehem at that time was a well of particularly refreshing water of which the king wished for a drink. The king did not place a demand or order for the water; he simply expressed a desire for a taste of the cool, refreshing liquid from the Bethlehem well.

"Without command or assignment or even duty, three of the mighty men broke through enemy lines, at great personal risk, to travel to Bethlehem. They drew water out of the well and returned, again at great risk through the enemy lines, to bring the wonderful refreshment of Bethlehem water to David. David was so overcome by this demonstrated act of personal, unsolicited service that he refused to drink the water. He considered the act so brave and wonderful that he poured the water upon the ground. The scripture says, "He ... poured it out unto the Lord" (2 Sam. 23:14-17; see also 1 Chr. 11:17-19)."

The specific use of water is only found one other time in the OT and that is by Samuel (1 Samuel 7:6). In that setting he poured out water to the Lord as a declaration of self-denial as part of a fast for Israel to be forgiven of their sins. Perhaps David's action is a dedication of the water to God as part of repentance and humility.

CHAPTER 11

David lies with Bathsheba, and she conceives—He then arranges for the death in battle of her husband, Uriah.

AND it came to pass, after the year was expired, at the time when kings go forth *to battle*, that David sent ^a Joab, and his servants with him,

and all Israel; and they destroyed the children of Ammon, and besieged Rabbah. But David tarried still at Jerusalem.

2 ¶ And it came to pass in an eveningtide, that David arose from off his bed, and walked upon the roof of the king's house: and from the roof he ^asaw a woman washing herself; and the woman was very beautiful to ^blook upon.

3 And David sent and inquired after the woman. And *one* said, Is not this ^aBath-sheba, the daughter of Eliam, the wife of ^bUriah the Hittite?

4 And David sent messengers, and took her; and she came in unto him, and he ^alay with her; for she was purified from her uncleanness: and she returned unto her house.

5 And the woman conceived, and sent and told David, and said, I am with child.

6 ¶ And David sent to Joab, saying, Send me Uriah the Hittite. And Joab sent Uriah to David.

7 And when Uriah was come unto him, David demanded of him how Joab did, and how the people did, and how the war prospered.

8 And David said to Uriah, Go down to thy house, and wash thy feet. And Uriah departed out of the king's house, and there followed him ^aa mess of meat from the king.

9 But Uriah slept at the door of the king's house with all the servants of his lord, and went not down to his house.

10 And when they had told David, saying, Uriah went not down unto his house, David said unto Uriah, Camest thou not from thy journey? why then didst thou not go down unto thine house?

11 And Uriah said unto David, The ark, and Israel, and Judah, abide in ^atents; and my lord Joab, and the servants of my lord, are encamped

in the open fields; shall I then go into mine house, to eat and to drink, and to lie with my wife? as thou livest, and as thy soul liveth, I will not do this thing.

12 And David said to Uriah, Tarry here to day also, and to morrow I will let thee depart. So Uriah abode in Jerusalem that day, and the morrow.

13 And when David had called him, he did eat and drink before him; and he made him drunk: and at even he went out to lie on his bed with the servants of his lord, but went not down to his house.

14 ¶ And it came to pass in the morning, that David wrote a letter to Joab, and sent *it* by the hand of Uriah.

15 And he wrote in the letter, saying, Set ye Uriah in the forefront of the hottest battle, and retire ye from him, that he may be ^asmitten, and die.

16 And it came to pass, when Joab observed the city, that he assigned Uriah unto a place where he knew that valiant men were.

17 And the men of the city went out, and fought with Joab: and there fell *some* of the people of the servants of David; and Uriah the Hittite died also.

18 ¶ Then Joab sent and told David all the things concerning the war;

19 And charged the messenger, saying, When thou hast made an end of telling the matters of the war unto the king,

20 And if so be that the king's ^awrath arise, and he say unto thee, Wherefore approached ye so nigh unto the city when ye did fight? knew ye not that they would shoot from the wall?

21 Who smote ^aAbimelech the son of Jerubbesheth? did not a woman cast a piece of a millstone upon

him from the wall, that he died in Thebez? why went ye nigh the wall? then say thou, Thy servant Uriah the Hittite is dead also.

22 ¶ So the messenger went, and came and shewed David all that Joab had sent him for.

23 And the messenger said unto David, Surely the men prevailed against us, and came out unto us into the field, and we were upon them even unto the entering of the gate.

24 And the shooters shot from off the wall upon thy servants; and some of the king's servants be dead, and thy servant Uriah the Hittite is dead also.

25 Then David said unto the messenger, Thus shalt thou say unto Joab, Let not this thing displease thee, for the sword devoureth one as well as another: make thy battle more strong against the city, and overthrow it: and encourage thou him.

26 ¶ And when the wife of Uriah heard that Uriah her husband was dead, she mourned for her husband.

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



There is no evidence to suggest that the washing that was happening on the roof was for ceremonial purposes as some people claim; it was just a washing. Leviticus 15 indicates that ceremonial cleansings are done during the day and the Bible does not link washing with menstrual impurity; only time. 7 days from the start of a woman's period to be clean. No washing required. "Later Rabinical tradition will require women to immerse in a ritual pool, but that was not a tradition at this time."

The reason for noting that she was "purified from her uncleanness" is that she had just become ceremonially clean after the 7 day period of monthly impurity due to menstruation (Leviticus 15:19-30). This mention makes it clear to the readers that she was not already pregnant by her own husband when David slept with her.

Another possibility is that this purification is a reference to Leviticus 15:18, "The woman also with whom man shall lie with seed of copulation, they shall both bathe themselves in water, and be unclean until the even."

"When Bathsheba purifies herself, she is washing off the impurity that comes with all sexual relations, even licit ones. In our verse, the phrase does not refer back to the bath that she was taking when she was introduced, but to postcoital purification. The verb form (present participle) also implies the sequential arrangement: having purified herself, she returned home. Of course, the use of the term purification is another ironic element in the author's narration: she can purify herself from the ordinary pollution of sexual intercourse, but the defilement of illicit sexuality is not so easily washed off.

"The mention of Bathsheba's purification, like the verbs that precede it, underline the unhurried, non secretive nature of this affair. There is no rush here. David does not send her away abruptly after he has satisfied himself. And she does not hurry off. 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



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"Abiathar and Joab were still conspiring to put Adonijah on the throne (see 1 Kings 2:22). Solomon banished Abiathar from Jerusalem and took from him the office of high priest in Israel. Abiathar was a great-grandson of Eli, who was both priest and judge in Israel, and the last of his descendants to hold a priestly office. This punishment and restriction of Abiathar fulfilled the prophecy announced to Eli by the Lord (see 1 Samuel 2:31–36).

"Abiathar probably escaped with the punishment of exile only because Solomon was reluctant to execute a high priest. Joab, however, was a much more dangerous enemy because he had commanded the army. There was no question concerning Joab's guilt. Because of the murders he had committed, he was indeed worthy of death (see Exodus 21:12–14). Thus, he had no right to claim the sanctuary of the altar, and Solomon was not obligated to honor his claim to sanctuary."

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CHAPTER 3

8 And at this house, which is high, every one that passeth by it shall be astonished, and shall hiss; and they shall say, Why hath the LORD ^adone thus unto this land, and to this house?

9 And they shall answer, Because they forsook the LORD their God, who brought forth their fathers out of the land of Egypt, and have taken hold upon other gods, and have worshipped them, and served them: therefore hath the LORD brought upon them all this evil.

10 ¶ And it came to pass at the end of twenty years, when Solomon had built the two houses, the house of the LORD, and the king's house,

11 (Now Hiram the king of Tyre had furnished Solomon with cedar trees and fir trees, and with gold, according to all his desire,) that then king Solomon gave Hiram twenty cities in the land of Galilee.

12 And Hiram came out from Tyre to see the cities which Solomon had given him; and they pleased him not.



The phrase "strange women" refers to women who were not of the house of Israel. [Remember that] the Israelites had covenanted to serve the Lord and thereby receive His protection. Marrying within the covenant meant marrying a faithful member of the house of Israel. The many "strange women" Solomon married were not part of the gospel covenant and came from nations that did not worship the Lord or keep His commandments. These marriages reflected political alliances Solomon had made with other nations.
